TRANSPORT (Tim French)

Priorities:

- 1. Feasibility of improving the footpath to Tring Station
- 2. Promoting cycling and walking
- 3. EV infrastructure (domestic + public)

Footpath to the Station:

The frequently used route is shown here

- The team have engaged with Clayton Rae, Dacorum Expert on Public Rights of Way officer in Herts Council, along with meetings with Sally Symington (Herts County Council) and Graham Juniper (Parish Council)
- o Currently no formal discussions with the landowner have been conducted
- Alex Irwin consulted with Peter Vallis, former owner of the fields between the village and the station; Peter explained that there is no legal right of way and during his period of ownership every 8 years he would send a written lease/permission document to the council to give local people the right to use the pathway
- Funding options:
 - Access to Dacorum CIL money; possibly sitting on £18 million
 - Dacorum is leading an impact assessment around Ashridge re. parking + reducing no.
 of cars in Ashridge + preventing further damage to the woodland area; this is an
 opportunity to prioritise and promote sustainable transport options (the footpath
 fits into potential investment in cycling/train/walking transport routes in the area)

Next steps:

 Step 1: Paying someone to do a feasibility study (location of footpath, what type of construction, environmental impact assessment and promoting biodiversity)

Any recommendations for a consultant who has expertise in footpath design is welcome

 Step 2: Formulate a proposal for Dacorum highlighting long-term maintenance considerations and how we would be engaging with the landowner (buying or leasing the land)

Considerations:

- There are several stakeholders involved; incl. Dacorum, Sustrans, Public Rights of Way, etc. – need to be conscious of how we work together on this
- Safety concerns: cycling along the current route is hazardous, a member of the group cited the section from the station to Beggars lane, in particular the bridge over the canal

Promoting cycling and walking:

 Sally Symington highlighted that the Highway's Locality Budget or the Member's Locality Budget would be suitable for funding cycle racks in the village; ASC or the Parish Council could make an application; Sally needs an estimated cost for the project + a site in mind for the cycle racks which she can then review



EV infrastructure:

- The transport team have reviewed the potential charging needs in the village (using a desk review survey of the houses in the village and how many could have at-home charged, conducted by Graham Juniper); the geographic is split into 3 main areas:
 - o Recreation Grounds
 - South of the village (nr Valiant Trooper)
 - Centre of the village
- Public EV charging option next steps:
 - Discuss with the landlord of the recreation grounds (the Church) and apply to the grid for costs
 - Tim has access to a charging company (possible upfront costs: £6000-£8000; running costs?); this either becomes a community owned asset (which would require fundraising in the community) or if the charging company thinks there will be enough footfall, they will fund it
 - o Funding is also potentially available through Dacorum or Herts County Council
- o Alternative options:
 - Encouraging peer-to-peer charging (possible quick win)
- At-home charging option next steps:
 - It is likely that a few houses in the village would need some support to coordinate with their current supply networks to facilitate at-home charging; Dacorum could possibly advise on this

Parking:

 Parking was raised again at the recent Parish Council meeting; next steps would include reviewing the possibility of liaising with the Church to help extend parking at the Recreation Grounds or creating a residents/visitors car park in the village

Friends of Tring Station:

Friends of Tring Station



Friends of Tring Station do not have a project lead despite promotion across local networks. We are seeking an active Chairperson for this group who will liaise with the Railway and organise the funding and volunteers for work parties. This would include:

- 1. Acting as liaison between Rail Operator and passengers
- 2. Keeping planters healthy and thriving
- 3. Improving biodiversity in line with Tring being a Bee Friendly Town sow wild areas
- 4. Improving passenger experience with
 - Shoe lockers in car park
 - Bike racks on car park side

- Electric chargers
- Seating by the taxi stand

WASTE REDUCTION (Sue Justice)

Priorities

- This subgroup used to be called 'Circularity' however the name has been changed to help with clarity
- O Promote the food sharing app, Olio, amongst ASC members and local networks; this app encourages people to share their excess food as well as lend tools/equipment); a few food sharing initiatives were suggested, including a community fridge, however Olio is a simple to use and inexpensive option; Jo Stone and Sue Justice have joined to test out the app; Kate Kelland is a local Olio contact for supermarket excess food; if more people actively use this app in the village, a community fridge would not be needed. Afterthought (to be addressed): what do local cafes and the Greyhound do with left-over food?
- The 'Sharing Table' at Jo Stone's allotments is functioning well with several residents passing on produce and plants this way; people who pick anything up are invited to make a donation to Friends of Aldbury School; it could be expanded so anyone in the village can leave or take fruit or vegetables there. Clean plants pots can also be swapped there. Plants too, but these should be in clean compost, not garden soil which may harbour unwanted weeds or pests.
- o Recycling
 - Informing residents (and offering help if required); Sue Justice will be writing an article for the Aldbury Outlook to raise awareness of recycling bins at supermarkets + what can be recycled in them
 - G Grace & Son is also a local favourite; people can take containers and fill up on soap, shampoos, conditioners; they are also happy for people to take their wooden pallets to reuse; Puddingstone Distillery in Tring also offer's £3 off their Campfire gin when you take the empty bottle back
- Instead of setting up our own repair café, the team have found a number of cafés that are already established in neighbouring villages and towns which can be promoted among Aldbury and Tring Station residents; these cafés already have resources, volunteers and expertise to help with repairs, including:
 - o Men's Shed groups in Hemel Hempstead
 - Open Door in Berkhamsted (contact Richard at repaircafe@opendoorberkhamsted.co.uk for more info)
 - Tring Repairs (every 3rd Saturday of the month)
 - Other repair cafes are also run in <u>Aston Clinton</u> and <u>Chesham</u>

Sue Justice is collating details about the repair cafes in the area and will help publicise them for our parish.

- Ted Bianco is keen to reuse pots for his sapling project; Tess Alps receives old pots to pass on to allotment holders
 - Any polythene pots headed for the bin are welcome; please collect and pass on to Ted
- Felicity is collecting coffee grounds for compost from Musette Café and distributing around the village
 - Anyone interested in receiving coffee grounds for their compost heap, please contact Felicity at felicityaris@gmail.com
- Annie Eggar has taken on role of liaison with the village shop. She will discuss with Sunny and Daisy about having a battery recycling facility there. Shops which sell more than 32kg per annum (about one 4-pack of AAs per day) are obliged to have this but we think our shop sells less than that (if any?)
- o Annie Eggar said the baby and toddler group already operates the selling, donating and



lending of baby and child equipment informally on WhatsApp (find out more on the village website at https://www.aldburyvillage.org/reduce-waste). She will look into expanding this more widely in the parish.

- You can recycle just about all soft plastics now in Tesco and M&S. Sue Justice has written an
 article for the October Outlook about this and reiterated what can go in blue bins. A flexible
 plastic recycling bin outside the shop was considered but it seems companies are only
 interested in placing them in bigger stores at present.
- The team agreed that it is important to develop a few ideas at a time. Other ideas
 mentioned previously include a clothes swap (there is one in Berkhamsted Civic Centre on
 Sept 25), upcycling shed for unwanted equipment, bulky item pick up monthly, more
 composting. These will be shelved for now but kept in mind.

NATURE (Jont Cole)

Objective: To raise awareness of our natural assets and to improve biodiversity in the parish. **Target**: To be the most biodiverse parish in Hertfordshire by 2030 – an 8 year goal! This would involve doing baseline readings (air, water, bioacoustics, etc.) every few years to monitor changes in biodiversity and committing to biodiversity improvement projects. This received unanimous agreement amongst the convening group.

Priorities:

- Ted Bianco and Paul Barritt's pond survey has received 13 responses so far; it would be helpful to put a reminder of the approaching survey deadline
 - Next steps include mapping where the ponds are and promoting further interest in getting a pond (ie. Writing another article highlighting other reasons why ponds are a good idea such as engaging children, supporting other wildlife); this would be good to promote in the Spring in particular when amphibians are coming out
 - Also useful to consider approaching the golf courses in the area which have ponds
- o Tess Alps and Tim are writing an article on bee-friendly plants
- Allotment Seedling Project (aims: promoting tree cover and more wildlife)
 - The Parish Council have agreed a contract for allotment space
 - The plan is to prepare the soil at the end of September and renovate the allotment space (e.g. building a shelter our of packing case wood/other repurposed material)
 - Ted has started collecting seed and is looking for pots to get ready for planting at the end of the year
 - The aim is to provide a biodiverse collection of species to optimise environmental impact and accommodate people's tree preferences (i.e. providing species suitable for small to large gardens, options for replacing fences with hedges); Ted has collected 11 species so far and aims to cultivate about 30 species)
 - No solid distribution plans as of yet
- Teresa Inglis raised a concern on Everything Aldbury about a local farmer cutting back the hedge between Brightwood and Staul Baulk; Jont said he would discuss this with Teresa in person

Other activities:

- o Partnership with Wiggington:
 - David Wilde, ex Parish Council Chair of Wigginton, is keen to get involved and do projects together; has run his own rewilding scheme and set up thermal imaging in Wigginton to monitor biodiversity in the area

NATURE Actions

Ted – collecting pots and putting up a poster about the pond survey in the village shop

All - Volunteers will be needed for sapling project to help share watering duties and soil preparation

Felicity - Advertise for volunteers in the Outlook/village website/Facebook when Ted needs them
